The record was titled Golden Barbershop Ballads, put out by Decca Records (...in Simulated Stereo). Not exactly what you would expect to find, directly behind Grand Funk Railroad.

The artwork on the album pictured four mustachioed gentlemen wearing skimmers and striped jackets. Notes on the back cover referenced S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A. twice, as well as titles for other "great barbershop albums", which of course were nowhere to be found. He played this record for years, nearly wearing out the grooves listening to the Rascals sing Little Pal. It never crossed his mind that this society, the one with the alphabet-soup name, still existed.

Soon the passion for barbershop harmony became intoxicating, forcing him to approach his band-mates about trying to sing Little Pal. As expected he was laughed out of that rehearsal. But time marched on and (yes...) his band eventually disbanded.

So in 1983, realizing that his life had a musical hole in it, his wife (Terri) spots a barbershop chorus' guest-night notice in the local paper. Just a 30 minute drive to their rehearsal hall, which isn't bad considering that before relocating, the same chorus rehearsed (for five years) just three blocks from his house. One tag with the guest quartet (The Cleftomaniacs) and he was sold. The rest, is years of barbershop bliss.

Recently life came full circle at the 2012 Carolina District Convention. He visits the AHSOW hospitality room. While wood-shedding with three gentlemen, someone suggests they try singing Little Pal. As expected, the passion that overtook him back in the early 1970's, returns. He can't help but ramble on about finding that Golden Barbershop Ballad album, and how he wore out the grooves playing the Rascals' Little Pal. The story flows trippingly from the tongue, but he realizes that everyone is laughing, (and all in the wrong places). Then he finally takes a closer look at the medal hanging from the neck of the guy to his left. It's silver! And on the lapel?? The name badge says....Don Dobson??? TenorRASCALS.

Oh, and Tony sang bass in the Mid-Atlantic District Champion and multi-International qualifying quartet, Doubletake.

ROBERT RUND, BARITONE

A barbershop 'brat,' Bob grew up in Saint Louis, Missouri, playing ragtime piano and singing in barbershop choruses and quartets since the age of seven. He began composing and arranging music in his teens. His mom plays a mean piano, and his dad was a barbershopper.
