One topic that has sparked a lot of reaction is 'Everyone in Harmony'. Here's what one reader has to say. Thank you for reading, and responding.

Kind of a narrowly focused survey with no opportunity for lengthy or meaningful opinion/rebuttal.

Also, wouldn't it have been more appropriate, with all the membership at stake, that surveys, like this would have been conducted BEFORE a decision of this magnitude was made?

I totally understand the economics of the decision ... and let's not attempt to deny that it is economics driving this inclusion ... I dig that if we're going to "preserve", we have to be around for the long term and this was a way to attempt to secure funds for that longevity. But having it forced down our throats is a bit dictatorial ... and by a board that is not elected by the very people they're decisions affect ... wouldn't you agree?

I love the diversity of A Cappella that's out there ... and, if this were an effort to unite all A Cappella organizations under one banner and one organization, that would have been an acceptable proposal to consider. Not to sound like a "kibber", but the diversity of styles, and gender, will only serve to pollute the original goal of the S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A.

I was an organizer for the Florida Gulf Coast Chapter, the Lexington County, SC Chapter, and now assisting Mike Stehlik with another attempt at a chapter in the Columbia Metro Area. I also treasure an award from the Heart of Columbia (SAI Region 14) for helping them organize and bring their chapter to life ... "Mark The Spark" is the predominant engraving on a beautiful crystal cube.

I dig the change. I'm just not a big fan of it or how it came about. Sometimes, asking forgiveness instead of permission is OK ... sometimes it is not.

Greetings from the President,

August has come and gone with a bit of respite after a very busy July for Barbershoppers, including the International

Convention in Orlando, and Leadership Summit and Harmony University in Nashville. The District Board of Directors met and spent a good deal of time talking about "Everyone in Harmony" and what it means to the District and Chapters in addition to normal business. At this writing, Society Headquarters is close to publishing a "Considerations for Chapters" document that will provide some input to help Chapters think about their identity and culture, and make a decision on whether they want to add to their chapter experience by admitting women as Chapter members. It is very important to note that Chapters are NOT required to do so and that continuation and preservation of the all-male form of Barbershop is of utmost importance. Whether your Chapter decides to change its model or stay with the one you currently have, I think it is useful and important to do a self-assessment at this time. It always helps to clarify what the priorities and culture of our chapters are and will be in the future.

The Carolina Statesmen are getting ready to get back to work with three

rehearsals scheduled between now and the *Fall Festival* and three more before Midwinter. They are recruiting men over the age of 55 who can commit to learning the music, words and interp on two songs, participate in the qualification performance at *Fall Festival*, and attend the **2019 Midwinter Convention** to sing on the stage of the **Grand Ole Opry** in Nashville. The guys who participated in the Senior District Chorus in San Antonio a couple of years ago had a blast. Please consider this activity as a wonderful way to sing on the International stage and see all the good that is being done with Youth at the Midwinter Convention.

The **House of Delegates** meeting is scheduled for Saturday, October 6 at the Richmond County Community College. Important business, including review and approval of the 2019 budget, and election of the 2019 Board of Directors, will be conducted. In addition, we will have two BHS representatives visiting with us to spend some significant time and discussion about "Everyone in Harmony" and the future vision of BHS. Our guests are Society Board Member At Large, **David Haedtler**, and the CFO of BHS, **Erik Dove**. The intent is to devote most of the afternoon session to allowing these men to talk with us about the changes that have been and are being made, how and why they are being made, and how HQ can help Districts and Chapters to work thru those changes. The governance rules of the HOD are that each Chapter has one vote in the business decisions. However, there is no limit, other than the room size to how many people can attend from each chapter. If you want to listen and participate in discussions of District business, I encourage you to attend. We do collect \$10 a head for lunch (not bologna sandwiches), and it would be helpful to know if we should provide for a larger than normal group. Please let us know you are coming.

Finally, I want to thank the men who donate their time to the management of the Carolinas District and to our Chapters. We can raise money when we need to thanks to the generosity of our members, but time is the most precious resource we have. Please be sure to thank the volunteers that make our District, and our Chapters, work so that we can all have a place to make beautiful music together.

Now Hear This! We have several openings for additional quartets to sign up to sing at Fall Festival, to receive a score and evaluation and join in the fun on stage.

At this writing we have 8 of the original 11 quartets qualified in the Spring who are planning to sing in the fall for the Quartet Championship. We also have three additional quartets who have signed up to sing for score on Friday night. This means we have an additional 9 slots available to any registered quartet who would like to sign up to sing for score and evaluation (only the Spring Qualifiers are eligible to compete for the District Quartet Championship this year).

Return to a 2-round, 4-song contest format

Note that for this Fall's contest, we are going back to the typical 2round, 4-song contest format. ANNOUNCEMENT The Society Board

"Today, June 19, the Barbershop Harmony Society announces the next phase in its vision of Everyone in Harmony. The Society's Board of Directors has prepared <u>this special</u> <u>message</u> intended for all persons interested in barbershop."

"The Barbershop Harmony Society believes that what we offer - the experience of singing together in harmony - is meaningful to all people, and should therefore be accessible to people in all combinations.

Since the announcement of the Strategic Vision last June, the Society Board and staff leadership have been involved in ongoing discussions about the best way to achieve the vision of Everyone in Harmony.

Today, June 19, 2018, we are thrilled to announce our next step in the realization of that vision. Effective immediately, membership in the Barbershop Harmony Society is open to EVERYONE. Beginning today, we welcome women to join the Barbershop Harmony Society as members.

Everyone means EVERYONE - people of every age, of every background, every gender identity, every race, every sexual orientation, every political opinion or spiritual belief. Every

person who loves to harmonize has a place in our family."

This was the historic announcement. Fully a year after the unveiling of the new Strategic Vision of 'Everyone in Harmony', it still caught most of us by surprise.

What does this mean to us?

This, and many other questions come to mind. The Society has prepared some responses to frequently asked questions <u>(FAQs)</u>. Additionally, the Society has asked for feedback in a Livewire <u>Survey</u>

What does this mean to me? Our survey says... Here's a sample of different views gleaned from the **Carolinas District 'Everyone in Harmony'** survey which opened in the June/July issue of The Crooner and was closed on September 14, 2018...

"When I hear 'Everyone in Harmony', what does this mean to me?"

"I support this vision wholeheartedly. Those who are not supportive of this new initiative are worried that we will no longer have men's choruses but they are worried for no reason because Barbershop is bigger than that. It is big enough that we can be inclusive rather than exclusive. I'm on board and happy about it!"

"It looks like a desperation move to counter a declining trend in membership. The Sweet Ads may counter by admitting men and reduce or make negative the membership gains of BHS."

"While I would welcome and and all persons into the BHS family, I do not believe that women and men should have head-to-head competitions. This would be an "apples to oranges" comparison in singing. I would support separate [competitions] for men's, women's and mixed choruses and quartets, as that would make a much more accurate comparison."

"End of Barbershop as we know it."

"It means thinking of each person as bring an instrument to the orchestra. If the instruments fit, who cares if they are different. Including all can create a new and exciting sound."

"Meaning is that the Society Board believes it can stuff its own social agenda down the throats of its membership and that post announcement surveys such as this will be totally ignored."

"Definitely need more blacks & Asians. Woman have a different style & voices. It is nice when men can get together without females present. Let the ladies sing with the Adelines. We can always sing with them in a joint show. Families with both sexes can sing together informally. There is no need for this new policy."

"Allow both genders to participate, especially if needed in a Chapter Chorus, maintain an all men's chorus and all women's chorus according to what chapters want and can do--some may have both. A small chorus may need both genders to survive...I think the changing times makes it a must to allow women to belong to BHS and local chapters--especially if younger singers is what is needed to survive and thrive in a capella singing."

"I have no opinion. To me, this is a singing hobby of higher-quality singers than my church choir, so I'm happy."

These and other comments, as well as the other five statements in the District Survey are being reviewed by the District Board of Directors and will be presented at the House of Delegates meeting in Hamlet.

The House of Delegates meeting is scheduled for Saturday, October 6 at the Richmond County Community College. We will have two BHS representatives visiting with us to spend some significant time and discussion about "Everyone in Harmony" and the future vision of BHS. Our guests are Society Board Member At Large, **David Haedtler**, and the CFO of BHS, **Erik Dove**. The intent is to devote most of the afternoon session to allowing these men to talk with us about the changes that have been and are being made, how and why they are being made, and how HQ can help Districts and Chapters to work thru those changes.



The Bigger Picture...

At the end of the Leadership Summit, Marty Monson took the floor and shared his vision of the bigger picture.

The Society, and its members, are made up of people that are highly engaged (it's a way of life) and devote a relatively large amount of time. They can be seen as the brown bar on the far right.

The blue area to the left represents an untapped market of people to whom the Society could provide goods (music,



merchandise) and services (coaching, event administration, etc,). They range from low level engagement and time devotion to relatively high levels of both -but are currently not members, nor might the standard membership model apply. If this market could be engaged, then it would constitute the larger vision of 'Everyone in Harmony' by providing a barbershop experience at virtually any level that the consumer desires to obtain.

Does Anyone Do This? Include Women?

Yes. We need look no further than our own Central Carolina chapter in Durham, NC. Their director, **Dr Bill Adams** (and our District VP Youth and Outreach) is part of the cover image of 'Everyone in Harmony' in the August issue of '*The Harmonizer*'. Within that same issue, Heart of Carolina A Capella is featured in the article '<u>Outside the Chapter Box'</u>.

Having our mixed ensemble has already saved the Chapter on a performance where we were going to be shorthanded in one section with the men's ensemble. The mixed ensemble was still able to make a balanced sound and was able to cover the performance."

I attended a mixed rehearsal of Heart of Carolina A Cappella last Thursday and was invited to join them on the risers as they rehearsed two numbers for their upcoming Bull City A Capella Slam (see Bulletin Board). I found riser discipline was exemplary and attention to the Director outstanding, even with direction and coaching from two section leads (one male, one female) occurring simultaneously. The sound of the chorus was rich and layered.

Next Steps...

It is now up to you and your chapter to have some frank discussions on what you want to be and how women will fit into your organization - if at all. And these discussions will likely be ongoing. Should you decide to move forward with women membership, the mechanisms should be in place to do that no later than January 1, 2019.

Society Headquarters is close to publishing a "Considerations for Chapters" document that will provide some input to help Chapters think about their identity and culture, and make a decision on whether they want to add to their chapter experience by admitting women as Chapter members. It is very important to note that Chapters are NOT required to do so and that continuation and preservation of the all-male form of Barbershop is of utmost importance. Whether your Chapter decides to change its model or stay with the one you currently have, it is useful and important to do a self-assessment at this time. It always helps to clarify what the priorities and culture of our chapters are and will be in the future.

In view of the larger picture, examine how you can engage with individuals and groups short of membership status, and provide support and measure the impact.

Finally, thank you for participating in the District Survey of 'Everyone in Harmony'. We're reviewing and evaluating the data and will share our conclusions with the House of Delegates in October.

The Youth Chorus Festival is typically on Friday and the Senior Choruses are scheduled internal to the youth ensembles, singing periodically throughout the Youth Festival. Saturday is typically the Senior Quartet contest and a final show on Saturday night.

corners as young men as they became the world's foremost jazz musicians.

Recent research by music scholars has shown that barbershop harmony - like jazz, blues, and gospel - is yet another indigenous American art form rooted in the African-American music traditions of the 19th century. In keeping with the BHS vision of diversity through radical outreach, Carolinas District is holding The Barbershop Revival to celebrate the contributions to barbershop by the African American culture.

The kick-off Revival will take place **March 22-23, 2019** on the campus of NC Central University at The Price Music Center. The Revival is a two-day singing workshop for college and high school age students to celebrate the origins of barbershop harmony in African-American culture. It will be open to the male and female students of NC Central, St. Augustine University, Shaw University, and other universities in the Triangle area.

We are expecting 50-70 attendees: 40-50 from NCCU and some from Shaw and St. Augustine's, as well as students from Fayetteville State and NC A&T.

The Fairfield Four has committed to that date. Joining them are quartets:

- o Crossroads
- o GQ SAI 2013 Rising Stars, 2017 5th place medalist
- o Halo All black female quartet from Maryland

Music scholars **Dr. David Wright** and **Dr. Jim Henry** will moderate a panel discussion on the African-American origins of barbershop harmony. Dr. Wright, Dr. Henry, Dr. Bill Adams, SAI gold medalist Debbie Cleveland, and Carol Stephenson, Greensboro Director and tenor in NCS mixed champion quartet Melange, will conduct master classes in a cappella choral singing.


